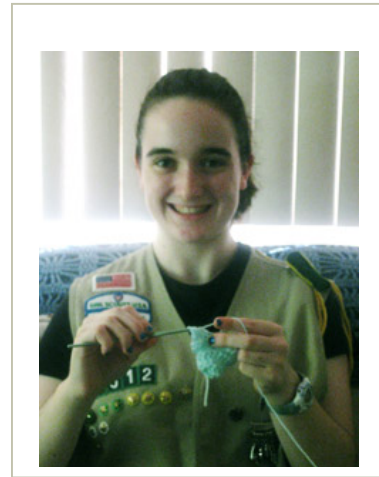

The Bel Aire Knit-Chicks is a group that was formed at the Bel Aire Condominium in East Meadow, NY for people fifty-five and older. The Knit-Chicks group developed after an introductory meeting with Ines Basso Glick and Ivy Greenburg, who explained the charitable goals of **CARE TO KNIT**.

Several of the women have taught novices how to knit and crochet. Others have donated wool and, those who do not knit or crochet, are busy sewing **CARE TO KNIT** labels into the finished items. A number of friends from other areas are also involved in all phases of the Knit-Chicks’ work. The women have commented that they feel a sense of fulfillment by donating their time and effort to the organization. They have a real sense of pride when they show their finished items to the residents of the condo.
